


A Message from our Bishop

We are an active, diverse, welcoming church looking to support our community and spread the word of God.

We are a parish that wants to look ahead with energy and creativity in the way we serve and worship God. We also respect the needs of those who prefer a more traditional approach to worship and try to be a broad church, welcoming all and offering a variety of traditional and contemporary services to meet multiple needs. We have a strong, committed and diverse congregation.

We are seen as a particularly welcoming church by newcomers and try to make our events relevant, accessible and meaningful for all. Teaching and sharing God's love is at the centre of all we do.

Support

We have an active volunteer base who support our administrative needs, many social activities and church and garden needs. Our two churchwardens are Liz Davies and Julian Sergeant and they are supported by a PCC of 10 members.

To support the vicar we have a Licensed Lay Minister, a Pastoral Assistant, a PAIS apprentice (https://paismovement.com/), a Hall Manager, an Organist and Choir Leader and a part time (23 hrs a week) Parish Office Administrator. We also have two occasional preachers and two worship leaders.

There is also support from Church House in Guildford and the Deanery Chapter.

Our Worship - our current services

8 am Holy Communion - short, formal traditional service, no music **10 am** Holy Communion (except 1st and 3rd Sunday) - Sung Eucharist followed by refreshments and a time of fellowship in the hall

First Sunday 10 am All Age - informal and contemporary worship with music and preaching followed by refreshments and a time of fellowship in the hall

Third Sunday 10 am Service of The Word - with music and a longer sermon followed by refreshments and a time of fellowship in the hall
 4 pm Family Praise - short and informal service with a focus on children and families followed by refreshments

Wednesdays 9.30 am Prayer for All

10.30 am Holy Communion - *midweek short service followed by refreshments*

We have preaching plans on books of the Bible and on our values. We use the Common Worship Lectionary in our services and have screen based worship.

We offer home visits and communion for those not well enough to attend church services and also run monthly services at Sutton Lodge Nursing Home and the Signature Residential Home.

Our Worship - Music

Music has enjoyed a long tradition at St. Mary's, and it forms an integral part of our ministry, our outreach, and our mission. Our church music programme aims to draw in and develop talents, to foster teamwork and fellowship, and to bring people closer to God.

The music programme at St. Mary's seeks the best of both traditional and modern music to support our liturgy and worship. St. Mary's maintains an Anglican choral tradition with a choir currently of about 10 regular members, in addition to extra singers who join us for special services and events. The choir offers an anthem or motet at Sunday Holy Communion services and also sings at special services throughout the liturgical year, including those of Holy Week, Advent, and Christmas. Choir rehearsals are held weekly on Thursday evenings and on Sunday mornings before the 10 am service.

St. Mary's has one of the finest organs in the Home Counties. A three manual instrument with 47 speaking stops, it received a major overhaul in 2006. We are also fortunate to have a Broadwood baby grand piano in the nave. Both instruments are played regularly in our services.

The church is used for concerts throughout the year, with both classical and lighter music performed.

We have an active group of bellringers who ring for the 10am service, weddings and other special services as requested.

Teaching Groups in Church

At St. Mary's we offer various ways for people to learn more about the Bible and the Christian Gospel - and so to know Jesus better.

Two separate **home groups meet weekly** - one on Monday evenings and the other on Tuesday evenings - and are currently looking at the Gospel of Mark.

We run **Alpha courses**, **Christianity Explored courses**, as well as the **Bible Society's Bible Course -** which many people find offers a helpful overall guide to Bible and Christian history.

We also offer **guided read throughs** of John's gospel and the book of Acts. These are typically one-to-one and so can be arranged very flexibly to suit the needs of the people involved. We have also recently looked at Romans.

We **meet monthly to pray** for this work, and for our congregation and parish generally. This is in addition to the weekly prayers held before our Wednesday morning services.



Our Community - the younger ones

We have a dedicated PAIS apprentice leading our youth work.

We run a number of activities for youth in the community:

Activation Youth

Activation Youth is a Friday evening youth club for those in years 7-12. The aim is to grow community and friendships, providing youth with training and discipleship. It fosters intellectual exchanges through apologetics and open discussions, and provides a safe space where youth of all kinds (Christian & Non-Christian), can feel safe and have fun. Activation Youth is split into two sessions. Session I, beginning at 5.30-7.30pm is for those in years 7-9. Session II, starts at 7.30-9.30pm and are for those in years 10 -12.

Trailblazers

Trailblazers is an engaging creative arts lunch club for those in years 5 and 6, which is held at Cleves school every Thursday afternoon. We use creative means such as art and literature to impart and develop values such as community, creativity, collaboration, communication as well as virtues, such as patience, kindness and love. We aim to show them aspects of Christ through each lesson that is undertaken.

Alongside this, we hold school assemblies and have school visits for Religious Education. We run Easter, Harvest, Welcomers and Leavers services and hold School Carol Services at Christmas.



Sunday Juniors

Sunday Juniors is run each Sunday, except for the first of the month, primarily aimed at infant and primary school aged children. They meet during the service for a time of fun, fellowship and teaching, including a hands-on activity, related to the scripture of the day. There is a 'show and tell' of their work or teaching at the end of the Sunday Service.

We run a number of special events such as Christingle making, Pancake Day, Mother's Day and Good Friday craft making.

There is also a children's activity corner during the service at the back of church for very young children.





Family Praise

Family Praise is a service conducted every third Sunday of the month at 4pm focused specifically on families. This includes games and activities, as well as dances with the aim of gaining wide congregational participation.

SMART Mother and Toddler Group



SMART is a very popular informal Mother and Toddler group meeting in the church hall. There are plenty of toys and activities to keep children entertained, with craft activities every week and singing to end the session. Every Tuesday 10–11.30 am (term time)



Uniformed Organisations

We have close links with the Uniformed Organisations and do regular activities with them as well as have their participation in special services during the year.



Meeting Point

A group for older members which meets monthly on the fourth Wednesday of the month in the Church Hall at 12.30pm for a light buffet lunch, thought for the day and then the Talk. There are also organised outings to the theatre, National Trust or the seaside.



Film Night

Meeting on the third Wednesday of the month in the Church Hall at 6.30pm for a light meal and drinks. The film begins at 7pm. The choice of film covers multiple genres, not just religious ones.

Adult Colouring Club and Knit Wits

Monthly meeting in the Octagon room at 12.30pm.

A relaxing meeting where we share our thoughts, enjoy each other's company and either colour or knit.

Fund Raisers

- Our principal fund raiser is a successful Christmas
 Fair for the wider community, with stalls, children's activities, food and music
- Open Garden in June in a parishioner's garden
- Christmas tree concession on our church lawn

Social Events

We run a number of social activities throughout the year:

Wider Community

- We participate in the Oatlands and Weybridge Community Fairs
- We work closely with other local churches as part of Churches Together in Weybridge and recently took part in the annual Walk of Witness with them on Good Friday
- We ran a winter warm hub in the church
- We make facilities available for a coffee van based in the car park at school drop offs and a pizza van once a week






Our Community - building an Eco Church

We are keen to be as green as we can be and have registered as an Eco Church. We were awarded a Bronze Plaque for our stewardship and our work on our carbon footprint. We are currently working towards Silver Status.

We recently built a bug hotel in the church grounds with the help of the Cub Scouts and Beavers.







We are fortunate at St. Mary's to have large gardens surrounding the church and are working hard to turn our gardens into a community space, where residents can stop and relax and enjoy the peaceful surroundings and the variety of planting.

Around the side of the church, we have a memorial garden for peaceful downtime and remembrance. We are busy planting new shrubs, bulbs and perennials to make it a sensory experience for visitors.

Our garden is guided by the principals of Bee Friendly, to become drought tolerant and pesticide free to encourage insect life and pollinators, in support of our aim to be an Eco church.

Dur Mission - we aim to love and serve

St. Mary's has always been known as a 'mission church' and we have partnered with and supported many mission agencies and charities over the years. As part of our vision and who we are and who we think God is calling us to be, we reviewed our activities and tried to streamline our partnerships in line with the teaching of Jesus in Matthew 25: 35-40,

> For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'

This we believe should be the basis for our current and future partnerships. Whilst we do a number of one off charitable events such as The Children's Society "Operation Christmas" Child", Christian Aid and support a school in Uganda, our local and global principal mission partners are:

Rentstart

Elmbridge Rentstart is a local charity that supports and finds solution for the homeless in our community. Rentstart

Walton & Hersham Foodbank

They are part of a nationwide network of foodbanks, supported by The Trussell Trust, working to combat poverty and hunger across the UK.



Each partner is prayerfully and financially supported with opportunities to raise awareness of their work and a dedicated champion from the congregation.



Safeguarding

At St. Mary's we take Safeguarding very seriously. Safeguarding is always an agenda item at PCC meetings. We publicise safeguarding contact details [ie Parish Safeguarding Officer, Diocesan Safeguarding officer, local police, Social Services and other relevant organisations] on posters at various sites in the church and on our website.

The safeguarding officer acts as DBS validator also and has been in post for several years and ensures compliance with DBS checks. Regular safeguarding training at different levels has been done - we have held two in-house courses at St. Mary's [Foundation and Raising Awareness of Domestic Abuse] in the last two years, using the CoE online courses. These were well attended and approved by the diocesan training team.



Our Parish Plan - where are we coming from

St. Mary's has a strong committed congregation and a real sense of belonging and fellowship.

The Covid years were hard for us, as in many churches, but we managed to support each other and continue to meet as a group online. Whilst our physical attendance fell during that period, we have seen a resurgence over the last year and a significant number of new members in the congregation. We have an increasingly diverse congregation and aim be a broad church but not yet explored Living in Love and Faith. We consider accessibility for all and continue to live stream our services to those who cannot attend in person.

Our Finances were challenged during COVID. They have improved since then, thanks to the support of our congregation, although continue to be put under pressure.

We have started new home groups which meet during the week to have fellowship and learn the bible, and run numerous social and fellowship activities for our members.

We recently appointed a PAIS apprentice to lead our Youth work in church and in Cleves School and have appointed a new Organist and Choir Leader to lead our music and choir. Our organ is reputed to be one of the finest in the home counties.

We have continued to maintain our lovely church buildings and renovate our gardens to provide a welcoming community space for people to come to.

Showing our Love for God and our community is at the heart of our mission.


Our immediate focus is improving our welcoming and ensuring that new visitors feel welcome, and have been spoken to by at least one member of the congregation and understand who we are.

We need to do more to grow our church and bring new people in. We are trying non church social activities such as a quiz night, wine tasting and a plant sale, where we can welcome in people from the local community.









Facts and Figures - Attendance




Special services are well supported by the schools, highlighting the mission opportunity.








SfM Dashboard for the Parish of Oatlands in the deanery of EMLY







Facts and Figures - Finances

We ran a very small loss in 2023, and feel we are in a good place in our finances. This is due to increased giving by a number of parishioners, continued fund-raising activities and higher interest on our deposits.

We generate income from a number of sources and have worked hard to increase our planned giving. We recently implemented the Parish Giving Scheme to allow people to give by direct debit rather than standing order, which allows giving to be increased in line with inflation. We currently have approximately 70 parishioners contributing via planned giving. We offer card payment facilities in church and at our events, recognising the move away from cash.

Church Hall lettings are our second largest source of funds and we have a dedicated Hall Manager volunteer to manage these. Our rental income comes from a flat the church owns in St. Mary's Road.



Facts and Figures - Finances

Expenditure is largely driven by Parish Share, and we are pleased to have been able to fund this level of cost. We have worked hard to minimise our direct costs, implementing new energy efficiency systems in the year. Our administrative costs were slightly down on the year as our Family and Children's worker and Music Director both left during the year, although have now been replaced.

The church has substantial funds behind it, although in reality £325,000 is the value of a flat we own in St. Mary's Road.


The Designated Fund is mainly used for the development and growth of the church, as agreed by the PCC.







Finance Dashboard for the Parish of Oatlands in the deanery of EMLY

















Weekly average planned giving per planned giver (2023)



A bit about our Parish

Oatlands village lies in Surrey between Walton-on-Thames and Weybridge, close to the River Thames. It is a popular commuter village, with good rail services into Waterloo (the fast train takes half an hour) and close proximity to the M25, A3 and M3, which gives excellent access to the motorway network.

The village is unusual in that it has no formal High Street but it is close to shops, restaurants and local amenities. There are excellent schools and good leisure facilities, with easy access to the countryside of the Surrey Hills.

A bit about our Parish continued

Oatlands parish was created in 1869, occupying land from the older parishes of Weybridge and Walton. The original mediaeval Manor was replaced by Oatlands Palace by Henry VIII, which rivalled Hampton Court Palace in size. It continued to be a royal residence and hunting park until the time of Charles I, and was then destroyed during the Commonwealth. The land then passed through a number of families until the 19th century when the coming of the railway stimulated the selling off of land for building. This resulted in the creation of homes for commuters and the Victorian heart of the village dates from this time. Plans for adding a church to the community date from 1861 and the church building was opened in 1862.

Today, after much expansion and new building, the parish contains homes in a number of styles and sizes. There are many larger detached properties, as well as new gated developments of apartments, townhouses and the original village cottages and villas. There are private estates and an increasing amount of sheltered housing and nursing homes, which are served by the parish. There are three schools in the parish.

Commercially, the parish has the Oatlands Park Hotel and many small local businesses. There is no large scale industrial development, but a number of major companies, like Procter & Gamble, Sony, Amazon and GSK are local employers and the proximity of Heathrow accounts for much of the local employment as well as attracting international companies to locate in the area.



A bit move about our Parish

Key relationships...

We are directly opposite Cleves School, the local primary school for children aged 7-11, which is rated Outstanding by Ofsted. We have a strong relationship with the school and undertake assemblies and pastoral work with them as well as services in the church.

Walton Leigh School is a day school for secondary aged children with learning difficulties. We also work closely with them, even though they are not technically in our parish.

Oatlands school is the local infant school and situated a five minute walk from the church.

We have strong relationships with our key community stakeholders and local councillors.







How to get to us



We are close to major leisure and shopping facilities and have excellent transport links, with the M3, M25 and A3 nearby.

Weybridge and Walton are on the direct fast line in to London Waterloo with trains taking approx 30 mins.



Out and About the locality

Residents have easy access to all London has to offer and are surrounded by beautiful countryside. Brooklands Motor Museum, Hampton Court Palace, Bushy Park, Painshill Park and RHS Wisley Gardens are all within 20 minutes of the Parish. In addition, the nearby Surrey Hills are an area of outstanding natural beauty with Windsor Great Park and Thorpe Park close by. There are numerous sporting options associated with the River Thames as well as golf courses and excellent council-run leisure facilities.







The buildings St. Mary Oatlands Church

The church building was built in 1862 in the Decorated Gothic style and was further extended in 1869 by the addition of the north aisle and installation of our fine organ. In 1905 the tower was added and in 1913 the church acquired the peal of eight bells which were intended to be hung in India for the 1911 Durbar. In 1920 the memorial Chapel was built to honour the parishioners who died in the Great War. The church has fine examples of Victorian and early 20th century stained glass windows and a traditional interior with pews in situ. The building seats around 375 with standing room for up to 450 on busy occasions. The church has an intimate and attractive atmosphere and is a popular choice for weddings.

There are large well planted gardens surrounding the church including a Memorial Garden for peaceful downtime and remembrance. There is no cemetery. We are working to create an eco-friendly, vibrant community space for residents to access and the garden is regularly used for church events and the sale of Christmas trees at Christmas.



The church has its own car park which was resurfaced in 2022 along with the installation of a bike shed. The car park is used by parishioners, hall users and parents at Cleves School and we have two mobile food trucks who also use the facility

The buildings - other spaces

Church Halls


There is a large church hall and an adjacent hall, known as 'The Octagon', together with a kitchen, male & female toilets and a disabled toilet. The Hall was built in 1965 and seats up to 85, the Octagon in 1986 and seats up to 35. These halls are often used for church occasions and are also hired out during the day and evenings to local community groups, bringing in useful revenue. The kitchen and toilets were refurbished and redecorated in 2015.

Office and Meeting Space

There is a modern dedicated office space, small meeting room and choir vestry that were developed in 2020.

St. Mary's Road

The Parish owns a two-bedroom maisonette within the parish which is currently rented to provide a steady income stream for the Church.



A bit about - the Vicarage

The Vicarage 5 Beechwood Avenue, Oatlands, Surrey, KT13 9TE









The Vicarage was built in 1994 and is located a five minute walk from the Church in a quiet residential road.

It is a well maintained four bedroom, two bathroom detached family home with a lounge, dining room, kitchen, utility and cloakroom and study. It has a good size garden, large garage and driveway.


National Census 2021 Dashboard for the Parish of Oatlands in the deanery of EMLY


